Do we really need Eurovision?

This Saturday night, as many as 100 million people will be watching the Eurovision song contest. An enormous amount of money is spent on the contest each year. Everyone agrees that most of the songs aren't that good and the show itself is in questionable taste. Is it time to give up on Eurovision?

5 This ridiculous contest doesn't serve the purpose for which it was created. When Eurovision began in 1956, Europe was still recovering from World War II. The goals of the contest were to help bring the nations of Europe together and to choose the best new popular song. However, the contest hasn't done anything to
 10 strengthen European unity, and it isn't a good way of choosing high-quality music either. While the contest was once judged by a panel from each country, today television audiences in most countries vote by phone. In both cases people tend to vote for countries that they like rather than for the best song.



Eurovision contestants are allowed to sing in any language they choose, with the result that many songs are in English. Rather than finding a song that represents their country's culture, the contestants are focused on winning. Not only that, but performers don't even
 20 have to be citizens of the country that they are singing for. This makes the contest far less interesting, and it misses the point of having different countries compete with one another.

Perhaps we could justify having this contest if it helped unknown singers build successful careers in entertainment. However, that doesn't usually happen. There have been a few exceptions, such as Celine Dion, a Canadian who sang for Switzerland in 1988, and the
 25 Swedish group Abba, who won in 1974 with the song *Waterloo*. While there have been a couple of performers who were already big stars when they entered the contest, such as Olivia Newton John and Cliff Richard, most contestants are second-rate singers who never become well known.

Amazingly, some countries still care about winning, especially the smaller countries. For
 30 example, during communist times, Eurovision was a symbol of liberty for the Estonians. Their television shows were censored and Eurovision wasn't broadcast on Estonian TV.

In the 1990s Estonia became a democracy and began participating in Eurovision. When they won the song contest in 2001, people ran out into the streets to celebrate.

However, in my mind, the pride of small countries is not a good enough reason to keep this
 35 contest alive. Let's stop wasting money and find another way to determine what the best popular songs are.
